 To truly understand Tarbes, there's nothing better than delving into the past to get to grips with important eras in the Biaorre capital...

Tarbes was probably founded by an Aquitaine settlement driven by the salt trade to use the Pre-Pyrenees road and the city developed under Roman Gaul. Despite the hardships of disease and war, it grew as new urban centres spread out over the land.

• The bishop built the cathedral in the market town of Sède in the 9th century. A second secular market town grew to the east as the Bigorre county base in the 11th century. At the end of the Middle Ages, six urban towns sprang up next to each from west to east. The 16th **century** Wars of Religion were particular bitter in Tarbes but from the **17**th **century** Tarbes was given a new lease of life with the reconstruction of the diocese, the establishment of a canal system and the building of a hospital. The economic boom came in the **18**th **century**. The consuls tore down the former ramparts, religious property was greatly enhanced and Tarbe became Tarbes. It became the administrative centre of the greater Bigorre department thanks to Bertrand Barère.

 Tarbes felt the long-term benefits of the major administrative reform and expanded again in the 19th century. It grew south from 1806 under Napoleon I with the foundation of the

The city gained a military position in 1825 with the establishment of the cavalry barracks followed in 1871 by the arsenal's arrival in Ferdinand Foch, 3 times Marshal of France the north of the city, a new area for growth introduced by the Jardin Massey in the middle of the century plus the railway's arrival all due to Napoleon III's minister, Achille Fould and the special attention he paid to Tarbes. World War II, Tarbes received the Croix de Guerre for its feats in the Voyage of Capitain Fracasse, Théophile Gautier, spent his early years in Tarbes.

20 National Stud farm



The renovated stud farm is listed as a "monument historique" and was founded by Napoleon I in 1806 for the cavalry. 8 hectares of grounds teem with museum treasures to show how great an impact horses had on the Bigorre capital: this is a garrison city which experimented, researched and founded its own breed through expert breeding: the Anglo-Arabian. Historical collections, vintage saddles, carriages, sumptuous stables, Empire-style architecture etc.

Villa Fould Pyrénées National Park



Fascinating façade

Villa built by banker Achille Fould (1800-1867), minister to Napoleon III, in the mid-19th century. Its Bigorre location seem related to his love for horses and the popular need to "take the waters" in the Romantic period.

The villa's heyday came with its impressive quests such as Napoleon III and Empress Eugénie as well as Prosper Mérimée, Fould's friend, who often spent his summer here.

The building is now home to the Pyrenees National Park with a museum and media area showcasing the Pyrenees' flora and fauna. It provides information and an understanding about protecting and managing natural and cultural heritage.

17 Théâtre des Nouveautés



The Italian-style theatre was built n 1885 and the vaulted ceiling in the theatre was decorated by a fresco depicting Bacchus in all his glory. Its entrance hall with frescoes, bronze statues, caryatids and lobby in keeping with the rest of the décor dedicated to accordion player Yvette Horner, (born in Tarbes) have made this theatre a real sight for sore eyes in the heart of the city. This wonderful cultural venue was beautifully renovated in 2011.

16 Halle Brauhauban



This market hall was restored and renovated in 2012 and 2013 and is named after the former mayor who commissioned the work. It is restructured around a central alley and has a market selling local produce plus various traders. Its architecture presents four artistic façades and two resolutely modern clocks. On the east side (rue de Gonnès), a canopy houses the producer's market which flows onto the neighbouring pavement for the weekend market. Its paved forecourt has become one of the liveliest hubs in Tarbes.

Place and Halle Marcadieu



The Marcadieu was a meeting place for Piedmont mountain and country folk, the people of Aragon and Bigorre. It peaked in the 19th century when it traded horses and mules destined for Spain.




Vallées was built between 1882 and 1897 and overseen by architect Louis Caddau (1853-1931). The

fountain showcases the natural wealth of the Pyrenees by embodying its towns and valleys. The artists Desca, Escoula and Mathet created an allegory: a real triumph of a city and its surroundings.

The fully renovated Musée Massey has two floors of museum nibitions showcasing two large collections:

The International Hussar Museum with over 15,000 items for an insight into one of the most unusual and fascinating military phenomena. The presence of the "hussard" (hussar or cavalry) garrison regiments in Tarbes from 1858 inspired this ternational collection. The history of the hussars covers the time from 1545 to 1945 throughout the world. It has its roots here in the Bigorre capital where it is kept alive to France's delicible Over 150 management and butte 600 weapons and a delight. Over 150 mannequins and busts, 600 weapons and a hundred paintings by artists likes Horace Vernet, Eric Messonnier and Edouard Detaille tell the moving story of hussars from thirty different countries.

The Carmelites moved to Tarbes in 1870 and built a convent. The chapel is now an exhibition hall





14 Sainte-Thérèse Church (13) Town Hall



In 1280 Mont Carmel nuns returned from the Holy Land and founded a convent here (Mendicant Order): all that remains is the spire. There were 60 nuns in the 14th century but only 4 during the French Revolution in 1790. The convent buildings were used to store fodder at

the time. Now the church is all that remains. It became a parish in 1841. You can still see its Languedoc Gothic architecture with a single nave and a beautiful 15th century bell tower, a relic of this ancient abbey.
